"An extra pair of adult hands in a primary classroom is considered gold."

This is what Lucia Vorpasso, the School Coordinator from Monmia Primary School in Western Melbourne believes the partnership with EdConnect Australia has delivered to her school this year. The volunteers have provided the staff and students with invaluable support that the school would be unable to normally access. We know that all have benefitted from this rewarding partnership.

By the end of the 2021 school year, 1,519 volunteers had supported 17,875 students across primary and secondary schools with 890 students receiving one-to-one mentoring and 16,985 students benefiting from our learning support program. This was a mammoth feat during a period of Covid-19 related restrictions and uncertainty. Understandably our volunteers worked fewer hours due to the interruption to face-to-face learning. Schools in Victoria were impacted in the later part of 2021 whilst in WA the first half of the 2022 school year was the most challenging.

The Board undertook a mid-term strategic review of the 2000-25 strategic plan in April 2022. The result was a recognition and recommitment to the relevance of our five strategic priorities accompanied by a refresh of objectives to guide the organisations through to 2025. Financial sustainability remains paramount, alongside an appetite to extend the program into new geographical areas and expand our delivery mode to include virtual volunteering. As part of our post Covid-19 recovery we will be focusing on rebuilding volunteer numbers, connecting with schools, continuing to build our technology capacity to maximise efficiencies and strengthening our impact measurement.

We would like to thank Board Members for their committed leadership and strong guidance throughout the year. Our Board does an incredible amount of work in support of the CEO and the Chair, collaboratively guiding the organisation in its strategic direction – for this we are very grateful.



With regret, at the 2021 AGM we farewelled long-term Western Australian Board Member Dr Anne Mathews. Anne was appointed to the School Volunteer Program Board in 2012, the first Board Member to bring intergovernmental, governance and policy skills. Anne has been a consistent and committed Board Member, upholding the values of EdConnect Australia and she enthusiastically supported the transition from The School Volunteer Program to EdConnect Australia.

The Board has had a very productive year. The Nominations and Governance Committee convened with the aim of expanding the Ambassador group and recruitment of additional Board Members. We are thrilled that Graham Mabury and Cheryl Edwardes have continued as core members of the Ambassador group and four new respected members of the community were welcomed by the end of 2021. The Ambassadors group has helped EdConnect Australia to expand its reach and connection and raise greater awareness of the impact of our programs.

Two new Board Members were recruited, Sabine Dejey commenced in January 2022 and was joined by Yawar Zoeb in February 2022, both filing casual Board vacancies. Their appointment strengthens the Board's financial performance and risk management skillset. The Finance and Risk Committee welcomed Sabine's expertise.

We sincerely thank our funders and sponsors for their commitment and support. The funding is essential to the program reaching schools in Western Australia, New South Wales, and Victoria. Student learning has been negatively impacted by the pandemic leaving students behind academically, increasing evidence of mental health issues and affecting those already disadvantaged the most. The EdConnect Australia program is highly relevant and responsive, able to collaborate with schools to identify and address students' needs and supporting them to learn and thrive. We invite key stakeholders, government, philanthropic funders, and sponsors to continue to collaborate and support EdConnect Australia's endeavours.

Volunteer Story 1000 Hearts

1000 Hearts is a kindness project. Initially one thousand pocket hearts were hand-stitched to be given away in random acts of kindness. Messages flooded in from people who received the hearts and the power of these little hearts was realised. A community started to grow from the small act of love; a community where kindness and connection are valued and hearts are healed.

EdConnect Australia work together with three important groups in the local community - Schools, Students and Volunteers. Our model is mutually beneficial and positively impacts each respective group.

A comprehensive approach to evaluating the program informs the impact of the program for the students, schools and the communities we support.

Understandably our volunteers worked fewer hours due to the interruption to face-to-face learning leading to lower return to the community than previous years.

^{1.} Determining the value we returned to the Australian community was calculated using Volunteering WA's Volunteer Benefits Calculator https://www.volunteeringwa.org.au/resources/volunteer-benefits-calculator The figure of \$43.51 is used as the replacement cost of volunteers' labour in WA and is averaged out across all given age groups. Calculated using a weekly volunteer figure of 2,506 volunteer hours' x 31.70 weeks (the average weeks our volunteers were in schools - WA and Vic) to give a total of 79,450 hours per year. The total hours per year (79,450) is then multiplied by the hourly rate of \$43.51.

^{2.} Return for every \$1 invested: Calculated by dividing the value returned to the community by the average expenditure of the last two financial years (2020/21 and 2021/22) which totals \$1,343,673.

Volunteer Impact

We survey our volunteers annually and it demonstrates a range of direct benefits that are a result of volunteering.

Number of Volunteers


The total number of EdConnect volunteers has proudly increased since 2015 with an increase of 466 volunteers over the last five years.



Addressing the Need

Focusing on disadvantaged or at-risk young people for education success and well being is fundamental to the purpose of EdConnect Australia. The range of factors that can contribute to disadvantage are multiple, both from a school and student perspective. Schools are impacted by such factors as the socio-economic status composition of the school, the size and/or location. Students can be disadvantaged by their personal circumstances, for example families needing government financial support, mental or physical illness and single parent homes. In addition the pandemic has, from necessity, increased the focus on how to improve student support, wellbeing and engagement and reduce isolation.

The Index of Community Socio Educational Advantage (ICSEA) is a scale used in Australia that allows fair and reasonable comparison among schools with similar students, providing an indication of the socio-economic background of students. In 2021, 44% of schools accessing EdConnect's Australia program had an ICSEA index of <1,000.

EdConnect Australia has become an integral part of the well being program at Wedge Park. We have participated in this program for many years and have had the pleasure of working alongside some fantastic volunteers who not only give their time but bring with them the values of community, citizenship and the importance of friendship.

Virtual Mentoring Pilot

In 2021 in Western Australia virtual mentoring was developed as a service model and was piloted for the first time in a primary school in the Rockingham area.

The pilot revealed that similar positive results can be achieved for schools, students and volunteers through mentoring online. Relationships were built surprisingly quickly; it was enjoyable for both mentors and students and the school could see the benefits in a variety of ways. The magic of mentoring that we see in face-to-face matches was evident even in this limited capacity.

I like having a [virtual] mentor because she makes me feel really happy. My favourite day is Tuesday because [my mentor] can talk to me. I like having someone to help with Maths. Thank you so much for having me, I'm really grateful for someone to talk to, thank you!

The logistics of setting up and managing virtual mentoring programs however are more complex and time consuming than for a face-to-face program for the school, which was identified as a barrier to the ongoing success of a virtual program.

Based on the success of the pilot, virtual mentoring was trialled in an additional school during 2022.

Impact on Students

Each year we survey the member schools and receive valuable feedback from the teachers and school coordinators who rate the impact of the program on students.

Learning Support

In 2021 EdConnect Australia began to gather data for our Learning Support program and it was found that in total, just under three-quarters (74.9%) of volunteers were supporting students in English/literacy and in total, 43.7% were supporting students in Maths/numeracy. Smaller numbers supported Science/STEM, HASS, Drama, Art/craft, Library or Gardening.

The Power of Connection

In July 2021 EdConnect Australia held an online event titled 'The Power of Connection' which was open to all volunteers, schools contacts, stakeholders and staff on a national level.

2021 - 2022 Highlights

Connecting in Person

As Covid-19 restrictions eased on the east side of Australia, volunteer catch ups returned to face-to-face. Strong catch up attendance indicated that this was a welcome change from the last years.









Transition Mentoring

Educational transitions have been identified by Government and Schools as a critical time for students as extra support is needed. Through the support of the Give Where You Live Foundation Pitch Up initiative, EdConnect Australia piloted a Transition Mentoring program in Geelong. Grade 6 Moolap Primary Students transitioned to Year 7 at Geelong High and at Northern Bay College for students in Year 8 as they transitioned to the Goldsworthy 9-12 campus. The pilot generated significant learnings and strong impact for schools, mentors and schools alike. 100% of the students surveyed in the pilot would recommend the program to other students. Thanks to the support of the Geelong Foundation, the Transition Mentor program continues in 2022-2023 in the Geelong region.

Mentoring Matters

Over the past three years, EdConnect Australia has partnered with the Inner Northern Local Learning and Employment Network (INLLEN) to deliver Mentoring Matters within the Vocational Mentoring Exchange, with support from the Ian Potter Foundation.

In the first two years the program faced some challenges, however in year three all mentoring returned face-to-face and on school grounds.

In total 13 Mentoring Matters programs were delivered and 68 mentors supported 188 students as they explored their career aspirations and prepared for the next chapter of life beyond secondary school.

Sharing our commitment and passion

Actively engaging with State and Federal members of parliament was a focus during the last twelve months with the aim of building awareness of the importance and value of the EdConnect program at a government level and to advocate on behalf of the volunteering sector as we recover from the impact of Covid-19.

Business Operations

Continuous business and service improvement was again a key objective for EdConnect Australia. Our improvement focus has been guided by the strategic Technology Roadmap developed in 2020. Timely implementation was greatly assisted through a service improvement grant from Lotterywest.

Several substantial system improvements were implemented including automation for gathering and reporting on feedback from volunteers and schools and significantly, the integration of the volunteers and school data that is provided to each school is now stored and automatically reported via the CRM system.

Policy and practises have been updated to reflect the changes and a new policy on data management was implemented.

The organisation has adapted and demonstrated flexibility in response to the constantly changing requirements and government directives related to meeting Covid-19 requirements.

In addition to the heightened communication needed to keep volunteers informed of changing school status to allow volunteers on site, systems were implemented to record volunteer and staff vaccination and boosted status to meet schools requirements for each jurisdiction.

There is now increased access to the core mandatory training modules for Mentoring and Learning Support via online modules that can be completed individually, within a small group or via a webinar. Face-to-face training continues to be offered. An online refresher training module has been developed through financial support from Bendigo Bank and the Goal Setting Module has shifted online though support from the Give Where You Live Pitch up Grant. Work on converting the reading module has commenced and a series of workshops on Cyber Safety and ADHD have been offered to volunteers this year through support from the Fogarty Foundation.

The EdConnect Australia team is committed to improve operations, and look forward to increased efficiencies and the ability to present more opportunities for volunteers to extend their skills and enhance their capacity to support students, schools and local communities.

Operating Results

EdConnect Australia has returned a modest surplus for the financial year to 30 June 2022 of \$77,915. Revenue was less than the previous year, predominantly due to the end of Commonwealth Government Covid-19 support. Excluding government Covid-19 support, total revenue increased by 13% from the prior year, with expenses increasing by 14%.

Service agreements with the Western Australian Government Department of Education and the Victorian Government Department of Education and Training provided ongoing support; and the Sidney Myer Fund, the Kimberley Foundation and Wylie Foundation once again generously supported management and corporate level activity. The Good Guys continue their support of EdConnect Australia as a nominated charity.

Lotterywest funded projects to improve the efficiency of our core operations, allowing EdConnect Australia to target resources for maximum impact and to pilot online mentoring in schools.

EdConnect Australia also received a generous grant from Lotterywest to carry out refurbishment of the Maylands office and create a fit-for-purpose, functional and modern workspace for the head office and the Perth based staff.

EdConnect Australia is able to sustain our program in the Pilbara region of Western Australia through the ongoing support of the Roy Hill Community Foundation (RHCF), including a three-year extension of this grant agreement. Alcoa Australia are generous supporters of the program in the Peel region south of Perth.

Local governments have provided additional funding for events and activities in local communities including City of Armadale, City of Cockburn, Hobsons Bay City Council, Wyndham City Council and Hume City Council. Victorian activities were supported by generous grants from the Gandel Foundation, Ian Potter Foundation, Dawn Wade Foundation, Give Where You Live Foundation and DOW.

The Fogarty Foundation and Bendigo Bank provided grant funding to enable the delivery of face-to-face training workshops, as well as the creation of online training modules to ensure EdConnect Australia is investing in the skills and capacity of our volunteers.

EdConnect Australia ends the year in a stable financial position, an achievement following the pandemic related turbulence over the past two years and the subsequent impact on program and project delivery.




